Pumpkin Glue Resist Project

This pumpkin project uses glue in a fun way...resisting the color after it dries. So cool!

Materials:

Template printouts

Black construction paper

Glue

Pencil

Scissors

Oil pastels - orange, brown, maybe yellow (or crayons)




Instructions:

1. Print the pumpkin template, cut out, and trace onto black construction paper.

2. Use the pencil to draw a line underneath the stem; draw 2 center lines, starting from the bottom points and curving into the stem at the

top; add one more curved line on the left side (middle) and another on the right.



3. Use the glue bottle to trace over the lines, leaving the pumpkin outlined in glue.

4. Allow to dry.

5. Once dry, take oil pastels or crayons and color in the pumpkin!





Print and trace onto black 9xl2 construction paper

Punpkin Bread

Ingredients:

2 cups all-purpose flour

11/2 cups granulated sugar

I tsp baking soda

2 tsp baking powder

2 tsp cinnamon

1/2 tsp ground cloves, optional

1/2 tsp nutmeg, optional

1/2 tsp sea salt

3 large eggs, room temperature

I cup olive or vegetable oil

15 oz pumpkin puree

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Butter and dust two 8x4 loaf pans with flour.
- 2. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together dry ingredients: flour, sugar, baking soda, baking powder, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and salt.
 - 3. In another mixing bowl, whisk together wet ingredients: eggs, oil, and pumpkin.
- 4. Pour wet ingredients into the dry ingredients and mix until smooth. Divide between the two bread pans and bake for 45-55 minutes, or until toothpick comes out clean.


5. Cool for 10-15 minutes in pans.






